



Monitoring the White River:

A School-Based Watershed Education Program

Fall 2025 Newsletter

Since 2013, Monitoring the White River (MWR) programs have kept students of all ages engaged with fun in and around the water, cultivating vital relationships in caring for water resources within walking distance of nearly any location. After significant flooding in 2023 and 2024, followed by historic drought conditions in 2025, our relationships with water take on extra significance and present ample teaching opportunities.

A 28 minute VT Public “Brave Little State” podcast that WRP staff contributed to has become a favorite resource for background info on understanding how much our streams and rivers have changed, why that matters in both understanding and addressing the impacts of floods and droughts, and some specific examples of what steps can be taken. Probably most appropriate for grades 6 and up, it is very accessible and we recommend educators have a listen and see if there are portions that fit for their students of all ages: ***What ‘Old Streams’ Can Teach Us About Flooding*** (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ha8iU8tvMWM>)

White River Partnership’s MWR network represents a variety of place-based educators with a wealth of knowledge and experience. The immediacy of the flood and drought conditions noted above have also led us to stay closely involved with the Equitable Climate Action Partnership (ECAP) and its efforts to empower teachers and students. Foundational experiences in our **Snorkeling** and **Trout in the Classroom** programs exemplify our commitment to working Partnerships, and model curricular ties to other core offerings.



White River Partnership’s core MWR offerings include downloadable, free use ‘units’ found on our website (<https://www.whiteriverpartnership.org/teacher-resources/>):

- **Trout in the Classroom** (with Trout Unlimited, brook trout from eggs to fry release)
- **Freshwater Snorkeling** (with the US Forest Service, exploration of the inhabitants of the pools and riffles of a restored stream)
- **Crayfish** (covering invasive species concepts through river and riparian food webs);
- **Waterbugs** (i.e., macroinvertebrates – indicators of river health and water quality);
- **Winter Track & Sign** (wildlife activities along river corridors);
- **Watershed restoration** (including culvert replacements and retrofits, trees and shrubs along streams, alternative stream bank restorations)



All of our MWR offerings are tied to our recognition that ***Water is Life***, and ***Water Connects Us***. We are committed to the health of the White River watershed

and its communities, and we always have an eye to watershed protection and restoration.
